Cameron Pass Nordic Ranger Volunteers Training: Dec. 2 & 5

November 18th at 6:30 PM at the Forest Service office.

The kick-off event provides an opportunity for potential new volunteers to discover program requirements and a chance to meet returning Nordics and enjoy several mini-educational booths.

The Cameron Pass Nordic Ranger Volunteer (CPNR) program began with 12 volunteers in 1992 to provide a backcountry presence and much-needed winter trail maintenance at the district's busiest winter play area around Cameron Pass.

The past season saw almost 100 participants.

The December 2 evening classroom session, from 6 to 9 p.m., focuses on safety, Forest Service regulations, and public contact techniques.

The December 5 practical takes volunteers to ski trails near Cameron Pass. Volunteers get a chance to ski or snowshoe a new trail, learn how to handle public contacts and get hands-on practice using Forest Service radios.

Special thanks to the District's Adopt-A-Road groups for their help in building the Kelly Flats trailhead fence!

Local four-wheel-drive club members helped the Canyon Lakes Ranger District complete the long-awaited trailhead for the Kelly Flats jeep road this past April: Big Thomson 4 Wheelers, Larimer County 4WD Club, Rising Sun 4WD Club and Trailridge Runners 4WD Club.

Club members installed buck and rail fencing around the newly created trailhead parking area of this popular high-challenge off-road vehicle route.

District Volunteer Programs

With your help, the past decade has seen the District refocus from short-lived, one time projects to on-going, collaborative community building volunteer work, and in the process become one of the largest Forest Service volunteer programs in the nation. Volunteer opportunities to manage this special resource are ALWAYS going to be needed-why not build a program around them and actually get to know people?

As varied as the folks who volunteer in them, each volunteer program serves a need on the District. There are three types of group programs (backcountry patrol, trail or road maintenance, and visitor center hosting); and three programs that require only one or two people each (volunteer office administration, webmaster, and shop volunteers).

Are these all the programs we'll ever have? No way! As work type and volunteer needs change, we'll have to change with it.

Restoration of Flood Damaged Trails Continues

North Fork

This trail has needed a lot of work- and we're getting closer to sticking a fork in it and calling it 'restored.' PWV, stewardship-minded citizens, the Forest Service trail crew and Forest Service Civil Engineers joined forces to rebuild washed out trails and bridges.

Volunteers provided 2,895 hours of service on this project in 2015



Work remaining includes bridges, some rock work and tread hardening.

In 2016, we'll focus on restoration of the Young Gulch Trail. Over the next couple of years, this will include construction of about three miles of new trail. We hope you will join us in these continued restoration efforts.
